Welcome to the Lisnagarvey High School Prospectus. In this booklet you will find information on our school aims and values, our educational provision in its widest sense and our many achievements. Continually, for the past ten years, the school's performance at GCSEs including English and Maths have been in the top tier of the very best secondary schools in Northern Ireland. In both 2019 and 2020, we were placed in the top 5% of secondary schools due to outstanding examination results at GCSE including English and Maths. The 2019 results were the highest ever in the school's history, at GCSE and this level of performance is realised through our values.



Our shared values of mutual respect between staff and pupils, high expectations of success within a caring and supportive environment form the basis of our positive school ethos. Within our wider school community, we promote tolerance and understanding of one another and value diversity.

In ensuring your child is happy and successful at Lisnagarvey, we recognise the importance of strong partnerships with parents. All parents are welcome to contact the school at any time to discuss their child and I can ensure you we have an open policy where parental involvement and support is encouraged.

At Lisnagarvey, we focus on developing the whole child and have a very strong record of sustained academic achievement. The school provides a wide curriculum to meet the range of pupil needs while our programme of extracurricular activities, trips and other events enhance learning and develop a range of skills including team-work, self-confidence and leadership.

Our vision is based on our values, and they underpin all that we do. Lisnagarvey High School is summed up as:

Through these values in partnership with parents we have created a caring and stimulating environment in which both students and staff achieve their full potential. Admissions Criteria

In the event of the school being over-subscribed, pupils will be admitted according to the following criteria:

- A Pupils who have a sibling living at the same address, currently enrolled in Lisnagarvey High School. The term 'sibling' includes adopted/fostered and half-brothers/sisters.
- B Pupils who have previously had a sibling attending Lisnagarvey High School for a period of three consecutive academic years within the last seven years. Name must be indicated on the form.
- C Pupils who have a parent who is employed within the school on a permanent basis, or who is a Governor of the school.
- D Children who, at the date of their application, are the eldest/only child of the family. This must be stated on the Transfer Application. Twins/triplets etc. count as 'joint eldest' where appropriate.
- E In the event of oversubscription, preference will be given to applicants on the basis of the initial letter of their surname (as entered on birth certificate) in the order listed in the 'Parents Guide to the Transfer Process' booklet.

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FAQs

Will my teachers be strict?

Your teachers won't be strict, they will make your lessons fun and engaging. They will also be firm but fair to make sure that you achieve your very best.

Will my subjects be difficult?

There may be some subjects that are new to you but your teachers are always here to help. New subjects are exciting challenges, not something to worry about

How much homework will I have?

You will get one homework each week from each of your subjects, two from English and Maths. It will take a bit of getting used to but they are well spread across the week to help you manage your time.

What is lunchtime like?

We have an excellent canteen with a variety of hot food and a sandwich bar where you can choose your own fillings. You will have an account linked to your fingerprint which can be topped up at the payment machines. Of course, you are free to bring your own packed lunch.

Year 8 Induction

We understand the emotional and intellectual challenge that the transition from Primary to Secondary School poses for our Year 8 pupils, so a comprehensive Induction Programme is organised to address this. Successful pupils are invited along to Lisnagarvey at the start of June to complete Baseline Tests in Mathematics and English to determine class groups. During this day, pupils also have the opportunity to participate in various other lessons.

In the second phase of induction, Year 8 pupils are brought in earlier than the rest of the school at the end of August. During this time they get to explore the school, meet their teachers and get to know their classmates. This helps students familiarise themselves with school before it gets into full swing, boosting their confidence.

After a couple hours of being at LHS, I felt as if I Technology and PE is brilliant fun!




had been here for years! You really don't need to be frightened about being a year 8 in our school because everyone is nice and helpful. I made so many new friends, very quickly. I love learning


Mason McFarlane - Largymore **Primary School**

Class Structure

One of the core values at the heart of Lisnagarvey High School is success for all and from the very first day of Year 8, we the right to fulfil their academic aim to prepare our pupils for achievement at GCSE. We use a range of information to place our students into class groups which are designed to meet their academic needs. At Key Stage 3 there is also focused streaming in English and Maths, to ensure that students have the best opportunity for success. A well-developed diagnostic of clear sanctions are followed. system evaluates those pupils who require special educational support or assistance with their learning.

Homework

Homework forms an essential part of the teaching and learning process. It helps to reinforce and extend work that has been carried out in class, as well as encouraging the habit of personal, independent study. Homeworks are assigned online via Google Classroom and are submitted online or in person, as appropriate. Teachers will provide a variety of feedback on homework tasks and at times will include pupils in the marking process. Homework is expected to be submitted on time and to a high standard and teachers will take action if a pupil persistently fails to meet expectation.

The Classroom **Environment**

Every pupil at Lisnagarvey has potential in a protected and safe environment and so we expect the highest standards of self-discipline and motivation. We take a positive approach to behaviour management and in the event of indiscipline, a series Where required, pupils will be issued detentions or placed onto a Year Head Monitor. In the event that a pupil is significantly disrupting learning, they will be removed under the 'Time Out' system.

Our Behaviour Management Policies and Strategies are based upon our core school values. and copies are available to anyone on request. The school expects and encourages the cooperation of parents in matters of discipline and policies are sent annually to all parents, for their agreement and signature.

Digital Learning

Digital Learning is a valuable way of encouraging student engagement and is embedded across the curriculum, via the Google Classroom platform. We set homeworks via Google Classroom but students can also use it to access classwork materials to assist with learning outside the classroom, revision and to catch up on any missed work. All Year 8 students are trained in the use of Google Classroom in their initial Digital Skills lessons.

School Council


Anti-Bullying

The staff of Lisnagarvey High School strives to eradicate bullying behaviour in school through the series of anti-bullying initiatives. The clear message in our school is that bullying will NOT be tolerated. We want any pupil who feels threatened to know that they may report their fears in the knowledge that the pupil displaying bullying behaviour will be firmly dealt with.

The school's Anti-Bullying ethos is reinforced throughout the year as the topic is discussed in lessons, at dedicated assemblies and during national Anti-Bullying Week. Every student knows what action to take if they experience bullying behaviour, or witness to a bullying incident and all staff are well trained in dealing with issues swiftly.

Pupils displaying bullying behaviour will be sanctioned for their actions but the main focus of staff is to provide support to all pupils involved in incidents of bullying behaviour. Often, pupils who display bullying behaviours, do so as a response to ongoing issues in their own lives. We support those students, as well as offering security and support to pupils who have experienced such behaviours.

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A Caring Environment

Pastoral Care

Effective pastoral care is instrumental in the creation of a supportive atmosphere in the school for both pupils and staff. Pastoral Care supports the development of the whole pupil intellectually, spiritually, socially, emotionally and personally. It is the responsibility of all teaching staff and is therefore fully incorporated into the classroom, however each student has specific pastoral teachers responsible for their well-being.

- Class Tutor Class Tutors monitor the progress of all students in their form class, including issues such as attendance and punctuality. The class tutor is the first port of call for any student with an issue or any parent wanting to discuss concerns they may have over their child's progress or well-being.
- **Year Head** Each Head of Year has extensive experience in the field of guidance and Pastoral Care and takes a keen interest in every student in their designated year group. The Year Head is there as a support for class tutors and to assist in any pastoral concerns that may arise. They also liaise with external agencies to ensure each child is cared for and that their needs are being met.
- **Head of Pastoral Care** Mrs Knipe co-ordinates pastoral care across the entire school, heading up the many staff who make up the Pastoral Care Team. She provides a source of information and a listening ear for students and staff alike and works alongside the school counsellor, and other external agencies, to ensure every student is supported.

Every teacher has a pastoral role and every contact between teacher and pupil presents an opportunity to develop the caring and learning environment which we seek to provide at Lisnagarvey.

Child Protection

As a school we are committed to the protection and safeguarding of our student body thus enabling pupils to fulfil their potential in a secure environment. Child Protection is paramount at Lisnagarvey High School and we strive to foster positive relationships between staff and pupils in order to facilitate good levels of communication. Our Child Protection Policy and Procedures ensure that staff listen effectively to pupil concerns and report incidents to the Designated or Deputy Designated Teacher.

Special Educational Needs

We have excellent facilities to cater for pupils who have Special Educational Needs (SEN). Such needs may stem from one or more sources: Intellectual, Academic, Learning, Social, Emotional, Behavioural, Medical and Physical Sensory. The modern and engaging SEN Suite consists of a designated area of small rooms suitable for teaching individual pupils, for pupils with medical needs and when pupils need a moment away from the hustle and bustle of school life. The suite also provides a wide variety of teaching materials and dedicated technology in the form of desktop computers, laptops and iPads.

The Special Needs Co-ordinator (Mrs C Campbell) and Deputy (Mrs K Bell) provide direction and training to all of our teachers. All Subject teachers are responsible for the teaching of pupils with special educational needs. Pupils with SEN are placed on the Special Educational Needs Register and will have an Individual Education Plan. Pupils who have a Statement of SEN will have this reviewed annually to ensure the provision is sufficient to meet their needs within mainstream schooling. Our teachers can also avail of the services of a Support Teacher or Classroom Assistant to assist pupils with SEN. Pupils may be withdrawn from class and given targeted literacy, numeracy or curriculum support in an individual or small group situation. To further support any student with additional needs, we can access various EA support services.







Digital Skills

We are living, learning and working in an increasingly digital world and we believe that it is essential that our students are prepared. We have dedicated one period a week at Key Stage 3 to teach 'Digital Skills'. In this class, students will cover a range of topics and have a safe environment to explore the digital space.

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Partnering With Parents

Here at Lisnagarvey we really value the contribution parents and guardians make to their child's education. Developing and maintaining positive and lasting relationships with our parents is extremely important to us.

Communication

The school uses the Teachers2Parents text service, enabling staff to contact parents directly via text. This service is used in many ways, for example, to inform parents that their child has performed well in class or has completed necessary coursework. Teachers may also contact parents by phone to discuss progress. Letters and longer announcements are sent home via email.

The school website is an excellent first point of contact, with important information being updated regularly and the school Facebook page is also a great way to keep up to date with school events.

SIMS Parent App

The SIMS Parent app is a vital tool which allows parents to be kept informed of their child's attendance, achievements, behaviour and progress. The app is also used to share information letters and school reports. Signup information is emailed home before term starts, as part of the parent information pack.

Google Classroom

Parents can be kept informed of activity on their child's Google Classroom by signing up for Guardian Emails. These daily or weekly emails provide a summary of assignments which have been set, scores which have been returned and class announcements which have been posted. Links are sent to all parents via email, early in Term 1.

Parents Meetings

Each year, parents will be invited to discuss their child's progress, at a meeting arranged by the relevant Year Head. An afternoon is set aside for each year group, during which teaching staff will be available for short progress meetings.

Information Sessions

From time-to-time, information sessions will run in order to keep parents informed of significant issues which may affect their child's academic or personal progress. Sessions are also run at the start of each year for parents of senior pupils, to provide information about GCSE and A Level study and give advice on how to support learning at home.

Representing Parents

There are two parent representatives on the Board of Governors, who are there to represent the entire parental body in key decision-making and important school planning. Our 'Friends of Lisnagarvey' association is also open to any parent who would like to get more involved in the life of the school.

Music

Music is the heartbeat of any school and we have a thriving musical community at Lisnagarvey High School. Under the direction of the Head of Music, Miss M McKitterick, students enjoy a varied programme of curricular and extra-curricular activities.

Facilities

The music suite contains a teaching classroom and three dedicated practice rooms. The teaching classroom has a full suite of iMacs, with specialist music software and hardware, as well as class sets of main teaching instruments. Each practice room contains a variety of contemporary instruments with numerous acoustic and electric guitars, electric and standard drum kits, pianos and microphones.

Choir

The school choir contributes significantly to the life of the school, performing at many school events such as prize day and the school carol service. Our choir also performs in the local community, particularly at Christmas time. There are a number of extremely talented vocalists who have the opportunity to perform solo pieces individually and as part of choral performances. Any student in the school is welcome to come along and give Choir a go, with rehearsals taking place during Wednesday and Thursday lunchtimes.

Music Tuition

Students across all year groups are offered the chance to receive tuition from school staff or peripatetic music tutors. Tuition is available in the following areas:

- Woodwind (flute, clarinet, saxophone etc)
- Pian
- Guitar and Bass Guitar
- Drum Kit and Percussion

Friday Club

Friday Club is a time for students of all abilities to come together and perform. The sessions are led by Mr Sheerin and Mr Liddle, focusing on the development of voice, guitar and drums. Pupils suggest songs they would like to learn and work towards performing them in different groups. Their hard work is then showcased in two school concerts, one at Christmas time and the other at the end of Summer Term.



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Preparing for the Future

Careers Education, Information Advice & Guidance (CEIAG)

CEIAG is embedded across the school curriculum, with the core aim to assist students to acquire the skills, attitudes and abilities to be able to confidently face the challenges of progression into the adult world of work and to meet the needs of employers. In recent years there has been a huge drive in relation to Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) as Labour Market Information (LMI) indicates that within such areas lie significant job opportunities, even within the current economic climate.

CEIAG at Key Stage 3 (Years 8-10)

are introduced to the concept of planning for their future through participating in a timetabled programme of study entitled 'Education for Employability'. The programme looks at the requirements of individuals and groups in the adult world of work at a local, national, and global level.

Across the three years, students will receive specialist talks and presentations from guest speakers, across a range of industries. They also have the chance to participate in a number of workshops and events based on a variety of skills and careers.

CEIAG at Key Stage 4 (Years 11-12)

At this stage of their education it is important that all students identify and focus on their strengths in order to be matched against appropriate career paths. Students will have received careers guidance when selecting their subjects and so should have a more narrowed focus on their career options.

In Year II, each pupil has the opportunity to complete a week-long work experience placement, in a bid to give them experience of their desired career choice.

In Year 12, every student meets with a Careers Guidance Adviser who assists them in making informed choices regarding their future. Pupils also undertake interview training and have the opportunity to participate in a mock interview day, conducted by members of the local business community.



Personal Development

Personal Development is at the core of what we do here at Lisnagarvey. Our positive learning environment enables young people to develop self-awareness, understand the importance of individual responsibility and make informed and responsible choices. We link with external agencies to ensure students benefit from a wealth of factual, specialist information on a range of relevant issues.

Key Stage 3 pupils also have a Personal Development lesson each week where they follow the InSync programme. These lessons give pupils the opportunity to explore topics such as managing change, feelings and emotions, self concept and managing influences. Pupils also receive information and guidance on issues such as relationships and sexuality, drugs awareness and managing risk.

At Lisnagarvey we are dedicated to giving our pupils every possible opportunity to develop socially, physically and creatively. We have an extensive range of extra-curricular activities, designed to support learning, develop additional interests and give students an experience to remember.

Learning outside the classroom is a vital part of our co-curricular activities. Pupils


attend various events throughout the year, across a range of subject areas and enjoy

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Sport

The rugby teams have shown great promise with some pupils now showcasing their talent within Instonians and Lisburn Rugby Clubs. We also have pupils who compete in local netball teams, athletics, swimming and dance competitions.

Physical Education

Key Stage 3 Curricular Provision

All pupils in Years 8-10 have one double period and one single period PE class per week. Activities include Netball, Football, Hockey, Rugby, Gymnastics, Basketball, Dance, Swimming, Fitness Training, Volleyball, Athletics, Rounders, Cricket, Handball and Table Tennis.

Key Stage 4 Curricular Provision

Students in Years 11 and 12 have one double period of PE per week. As well as team sports, they are given the opportunity to participate in a recreational programme including Volleyball, Table Tennis, Self Defense, Unihoc and Dodge ball. Students also have the option of choosing OCN Sport Studies at KS4.

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Sixth Form

As students approach the end of Key Stage 4, they will undoubtedly be thinking of what their post-16 life holds. At Lisnagarvey High School we strive to give all of our students the very best opportunities for academic success, but also to prepare young people for life beyond A-Levels. Students flourish in our supportive Sixth Form environment and we offer a personalised approach to every student.

Supported Learning

As an inclusive, caring and child-centred school, Lisnagarvey High School enhances and supports personal, social and academic development of each individual student in all aspects of school life.

All staff play an important role, both within and beyond the classroom, ensuring that all students are given every opportunity to reach their full potential, regardless of ability or background.

An induction programme for Sixth Form students before they begin in September, eases the transition from Year 12 and gives them the opportunity to build new friendships and develop their communication and team-work skills.

This continues through enrichment activities and Class Tutor time. Each student has a class tutor who meets them twice per week and is the first point of contact for parents. The Head of Sixth Form monitors and supports all aspects of student progress and development.

We value the relationship between parents and guardians and encourage both formal and informal contact, should the need arise.

Sixth Form Committee and Prefects

The Sixth Form Committee plays a key role in Lisnagarvey High School. It is led by Sixth Form students, who have applied to take part and are responsible for helping to organise school events, rewards, charity events and the school formal. The Sixth Form help set the agenda for the meetings and are responsible for the communication of the outcomes to the Principal and Senior Leadership Team.

Prefects are chosen from Sixth Form based on their conduct, work ethic and contribution to school life. Their role supports students and staff, and prefects and play an active role in key events such as Open Evening.

Careers

Careers Education, Information and Guidance (CEIAG) is a central component throughout all years at Lisnagarvey High School. In Sixth Form students continue to have careers education.

The primary aim in careers is to assist students to know themselves better, to be aware of education, training, labour demands (LMI), career opportunities and to make the transition from school to an ever-changing working economy. Careers Education is embedded in the teaching of every subject.

Careers lessons put great emphasis on getting students prepared for the next stage of their educational journey or the start of their chosen career path. Students receive individual support so they can make the decision that is right for them. All students have a link teacher to assist them with university applications and career interviews take place with the careers staff and the Department for Education Officer.

The Careers Department have good relationships with local Employers, Universities, Further and Higher Education Colleges so that students benefit from expert advice; many visit the school to give presentations which assist the students in making informed decisions for their future.

Students engage in Career Conventions with ambassadors from the world of work and avail of many opportunities to attend annual Open Days in local and national universities. In Year 13, students are able to experience the world of work for one week in a career area that is of interest to them.

A Level Curriculum

Pathways - 3 A-Levels

Students who select the 3 A-level route will be able to select from a range of qualifications, including:

- GCE A-Level
- BTEC Level 3 (Single and Double Award)

Students will select one subject from each option block.

Pathways - Transition

In recent years we have become more aware of students who wish to remain at Lisnagarvey, but feel unable to study three A-Levels.

In order to try and provide such students with progression routes, we offer a one-year course, which includes:

- OCNNI Level 3 Diploma in Employability and Professional Development Skills
- CCEA Level 3 Certificate of Personal Effectiveness
- GCSE English and Mathematics repeat classes
- Participation in an enrichment programme
